





ANNUAL HIGHLIGHTS

Board members, Advisory Council members, and committees have worked hard in 2016–2017 to increase the value of SCGIS to its members, to grow and diversify membership, to expand member participation in Society activities, and to strengthen the operational foundation of SCGIS. We hosted a series of 9 webinars on various conservation GIS topics, increased member engagement with activities and social networking, expanded membership with value-added member benefits, added two new domestic chapters, and improved the financial framework for the organization. In addition, our annual signature programs for International Scholars and the SCGIS Conference were among the best in our history.

SCGIS supported 19 International Scholars from Argentina, Australia, Bangladesh, Bolivia, Brazil, Colombia, Gabon, Japan, Kenya, Liberia, Madagascar, Malaysia, Mozambique, New Zealand, Pakistan, Peru, Russia, and Zambia. Scholars attended a 4-week training workshop in conservation GIS that was hosted by SCGIS and based at the University of California-Davis campus and in Redlands, California. After training, Scholars attended both the Esri International User's Conference and the SCGIS Conference.







SCGIS 2017 Annual Report

The **20**th **Anniversary SCGIS Conference** achieved record attendance of nearly 250 attendees, including 61 students, to *Look at the Past, Present, and Future of Conservation GIS*. As the premier international event for conservation GIS practitioners, the conference featured technical workshops, more than 80 papers, a new special panel discussion on Using Maps for Advocacy, a student competition, and many opportunities to network among the SCGIS community.



ANNUAL GOALS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

2016–2017 provided an opportunity to reflect on accomplishments over our 20-year history, and to build a strong foundation for the next 20 years. With support from our Advisory Council and eight programmatic committees, the board identified a series of strategic goals for 2016–2017 to support our mission. Working together, we have achieved exceptional accomplishments to increase the value of SCGIS to its members, to grow and diversify membership, to expand member participation in Society activities, and to strengthen the operation foundation of SCGIS. In coordination with the board and other committees, the Conference Committee organizes the programmatic and logistical aspects of creating a successful SCGIS Annual Conference. For 2016–2017, our committee worked to: decide on a conference theme, develop a conference program, obtain keynote speakers, negotiate finances and logistics with Asilomar Conference Center, organize preconference workshops, process abstract submissions, market and outreach, process registrations, and engage a large network of volunteers to lead conference activities.

The 2017 20th Anniversary SCGIS Conference achieved milestone success with record attendance of nearly 250 participants. We highlighted a new Maps for Advocacy session that was extremely popular with participants, and we successfully planned 2 keynote speakers, 4 technical workshops, more than 80 speaker sessions, a map competition, a map gallery, and our signature auction. With the help of the Finance Committee, we secured new conference sponsorships in 2017 and developed a financial budgeting and reporting systems to better plan for and track conference income and expenses.

The SCGIS Annual Conference has traditionally been held at the Asilomar Conference Center in Monterey, CA, and we have reserved Asilomar again for 2018. The Conference Committee began to research other potential sites, with several options identified, but no decision on a venue beyond 2018 has yet been made. The Conference Committee will continue to work toward developing affordable, informative, and educational conferences for the conservation GIS community.

Over the past year, our Domestic Chapters Committee has helped to facilitate and welcome brand-new domestic chapters in Portland, Oregon and New York-New Jersey. Other SCGIS domestic chapters include San Francisco, California; northern Ohio; and Washington, DC. The SCGIS community is consistently identified as one of the most appreciated benefits of SCGIS membership, and efforts to build community through domestic chapters expand those benefits to a larger network of current and potential members.

Domestic chapters have hosted regional symposiums, showcased conservation GIS work through local seminars, and have hosted networking events like happy hours. The Domestic Chapters Committee continues to provide support for existing chapters and helps to establish chapters in other regions of the US according to interest within the SCGIS membership.

The SCGIS Executive Committee is comprised of the four officers of the Board: the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, and Secretary, who are the volunteers with the most responsibility for the Society. This committee was founded in 2015 to enhance the leadership capacity of the organization. The Executive Committee serves to advance the activities established and prioritized by the SCGIS Board, and provides general organizational leadership and governance.

The primary task of this committee is to provide support for follow through on activities identified at the monthly SCGIS board meetings, and help set board meeting agendas. With the Board and most

committees meeting once a month, the Executive Committee seeks to improve the efficiency and expand the scope of what can be accomplished both during and in the time between board meetings.

Over the last several years it has been operating, the Executive Committee has increased the opportunity for communication among the board officers, and has resulted in greater accountability for advancing the goals of the Board and the SCGIS committees. This committee also serves as a point of cultivation for a ladder of leadership from within the ranks of the Society.

- Developed a first-ever comprehensive SCGIS annual budget, including income and expenses for each of SCGIS's organizational committees.
- Provided enhanced information and transparency to the Board with improved and regular reporting of current and historic financial data.
- Migrated SCGIS accounting to an online system for better real-time tracking of fiscal activity.
- Began development of an organizational Financial Handbook to establish protocols for SCGIS fiscal management.





This was an important transition year for SCGIS international and scholarship programs starting with the loss of long-time scholar coordinator Sasha Yumakaev, who had been supported in the position full-time by Esri for the past 12 years. The scholarship program adapted into a volunteer-led collaborative task including the SCGIS train the trainer (TTT) program. This change has highlighted the importance of international SCGIS chapters in organizing conservation GIS training in their home countries, with our TTT program providing needed local instructors.

2016–17 highlights include a significant increase in in-kind support from our leadership team; the addition of science faculty for advanced conservation research applications; a new course in conservation imagery analysis; increase in scholar program size by four to 19 scholars, including first-ever participants from Liberia, Pakistan, Gabon and Bolivia; doubling the TTT candidate program to two

TTT candidates, including trainers Angela Tarimy and Tatenda Muchopa; and the addition of a new training assistant position filled by Dr. Adnane Labbaci, head of GIS for the Morocco Forestry Department. We are strategically developing TTT training capacity to support every global region.

Our eastern European chapters including Bulgaria, Slovenia and Russia successfully held their *Third European SCGIS Conference* in 2016, organized by an academic panel of dozens of distinguished researchers and attended by special delegations of local youth. A delegate from SCGIS Russia attended the SCGIS 2017 international conference and gave the first-ever international chapters report.

Our Membership Committee has been busy with efforts to inspire current and potential members to join and renew membership in the Society. We hosted a successful membership drive that added 115 inspired conservationists to join SCGIS or to renew their membership. SCGIS currently has more than 600 active, paying members from 48 different countries.

We implemented PayPal as a new payment method this year, which offers a viable alternative to credit card payments, especially for international members. The Membership Committee organized SCGIS outreach at the Esri Federal UC in Washington, DC and at the Esri International User Conference in San Diego. The committee continues to support the active SCGIS membership and works with other committees to reach out to former and potential members.


The Website Committee facilitates direct contribution, discussion, learning, and sharing of conservation and GIS-related content by practitioners worldwide, including SCGIS members and non-members alike. The committee has a particularly close relationship with the SCGIS Communications Committee and their task of curating content for SCGIS media including the website. In this relationship, the Website Committee acts as a facilitator for Communications Committee tasks, ensuring that web capabilities and functionalities are created and maintained as needed, and to provide supplementary authorship and content creation for communications. The Website Committee coordinates content through the public-facing www.scgis.org website with additional support and materials at www.conservationgis.org.



MEMBERSHIP SUMMARY

SCGIS has records for more than 6,600 historical members, but improving member retention has been a consistent challenge. We have met goals this year to increase membership and secure higher retention for existing members. Numbers as of July 31, 2017 include a 11.7% year-over-year increase in memberships, including significant improvement in member retention.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

SCGIS had total net assets of \$126,080 as of September 30, 2016. For the fiscal year of October 2016 through September 2017, we have significantly strengthened organizational finances. Five-year income and expense trends are shown in tables below, based on data available as of August 31, 2017. Slight changes are expected during the final month of the fiscal year.

- Income has increased significantly in FY2016–17 to \$176,185 (estimated) as of August 31, 2017.
 The Society is supported by income from an endowment, donors, membership fees, and event fees.
- Growth in income has enabled expansion of programming for more members, a larger international scholarship program, new domestic chapters, and more attendees at our annual conference.
- After an increase in expenses in our previous fiscal year, efforts were made this past year to improve expense planning for multiple programs. Expenses have stabilized this year to \$150,688 (estimated) as of August 31, 2017.



¹FY2016–17 numbers include available information as of August 31, 2017 and will be updated to final reflect numbers after the completion of the fiscal year. For consistency of recurring operations, expense tables specifically exclude one-time expense for strategic planning.
